The game is played in 10 rounds, be visual or audio. One player at each chase a balloon for \$10 for the Balloon table oversees an answer sheet that reflects the consensus of that table's players. After each round, each table has a few minutes to fill in any blanks or change its answers, after which their answer sheet is brought over to a panel of judges who review the answers and give each table a score from zero to 10. And there's a way for a table to leave a blank space if they don't know the answer, without hurting their score: the Mulligan!

Before the trivia game officially begins at 7 p.m., each table will be able to purchase a strip of 10 stick-on Mulligans, stickers that they can paste on the answer sheet in place of one of the ten answers in each round. With a Mulligan in place of a blank space for question you and your tablemates couldn't answer, you'll get credit for the question as if you answered it correctly.

A strip of 10 Mulligans will cost \$10 per table. (While its origin is uncertain, the best known use of a Mulligan is in golf, in which a player is informally allowed to replay a stroke,
