## We're Heading into a Busy Holiday Season

We needed that one whoosh of snow on October on page 3. 31 to remind us that winter is around the corner. The holidays are coming too, and with that a couple of major activities for Society members.

But before we get ahead of ourselves, may we point out that this month we will be saluting out veterans in a post Veterans Day talk by someone who has spent a good portion of his life focused on their fates: Mark DePue, head of the Oral History section of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum.

DePue has been in the forefront of bringing the story of our World War II veterans to the public, most noitably through a series of special programs that began this past June in conjunction with a special Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library exhibition, In This Great Struggle, the Greatest Generation Remembers World War II that extended to a half-dozen related activities ranging from a "Superheroes Boot Camp" family event at Union Square Park in conjunction with the Illinois State Military Museum to an analysis of World War II themed movies and how they fare in the face of history, even a Rosie the Riveter session where youngsters could learn more about the World War II icon of women in the workplace.

This month, DePue will be providing Society members with a Powerpoint presentation that offers insight into how and why he has been assembling the compelling stories woven from the experiences of veterans that represent a cross-section of conflicts including Korea, Viet Nam, the Gulf War and other contingencies.

You may want hear from some of these veterans directly and can do so November 7 at 6:30 p.m. when DePue hosts a special program in the Museum's Union Theater with three veterans of World War II. It's free but reservations are recommended. See the details

And don't miss seeing the Museum's display (which runs through January 12) that in addition to audio and videos of those who landed at Normandy, survived Pearl Harbor, worked in an aircraft factory or discovered Nazi death camps, has a remarkable collection of artifacts including Eisenhower's helmet, a World War II motorcycle and forged papers given to a downed pilot by the French Resistance.

As usual, the Society takes a brief respite from its program meetings in December, but that doesn't mean we stop working on our 2020 offerings. You'll hear more about what's ahead when Historico resumes publication in late December.

In the meantime, we hope you'll join us for our annual holiday party on December 10, a convivial social evening filled with conversation, finger food and delicious desserts in an informal setting.

We also hope you'll have time to stop by the Festival of Trees and see this year's Society entry, a red, white, and blue salute to our nation. The Festival runs from November 23 through December 1 in the Orr Building on the State Fairgrounds.


