#### Society Opens Next Round of Grant Program, Deadline November 15

Earlier this year, through its Special Projects grant program, the Sangamon County Historical Society provided financial underpinnings for efforts that:

- Inspired a group of children to learn more about the Emancipation Proclamation.
- Helped Visitors and residents define Williamsville's role in local history.
- Supported the efforts of several organization working together to show

what life was like here during the Civil War.

The next phase begins this month when the Special Projects Committee, under the direction of board member David Scott, reviews a new set of applications to support unique educational and literary history projects designed to promote a better understanding of our country's history. The deadline for filing a grant request is November 15.

"Groups and individuals can apply for grants up to \$1,000 for projects that are of interest and value to citizens of the county," explains Scott. "The Society is particularly interested in applications for projects involving students and teachers in schools as well as local history groups." The Special Projects Committee reviews all the applications and makes its recommendations to the Society's board, which makes the final decision.

# Grants Program Now Entering Second Phase



In the first round of funding, the Society awarded the Abraham Lincoln Association \$750 to help purchase T-shirts and caps for youths participating in a military parade and other activities reenacting the life of Civil War soldiers that was part of an 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation event on August 3 at the Old State Capitol, the Lincoln Home, and Oak Ridge Cemetery.

It also provided \$500 to help pay for printing and promotional costs for the Springfield Art Association in conjunction with four other Springfield historic groups that jointly present "The Fiery Trial: Civil War Stories by Candlelight" on September 28. The candlelight tour, held at the Association's historic Edwards Place, the Illinois State Military Museum, Lincoln Tomb, Iles House and the Lincoln Home National Historic Site, also focused on the Emancipation Proclamation.

A \$500 award to the Village of Williamsville covered the estimated graphic design costs for historic site marker unveiled in September at the community's Annual Fall Festival. Affixed to one of its historic buildings, the marker details Williamsville's early transportation system including the Inter Urban rail that provided a direct link into downtown Springfield and points east and west from the late 1800s through the mid 1900s



After the survivors' evacuation from Hungnam, Goulet saw more combat in South Korea as the front line moved back and forth before finally settling down near the 38<sup>th</sup> parallel.

You can also drop passengers off at the circle drive entrance to the Sangamon Auditorium (Public Affairs Center) which has a hallway as you go in on then left through to the Library. AS THE MAP SAYS, be sure to park in one of the three lots designated for Visitor Parking lest you find a ticket pinned under your window wiper. All three lots are relatively close (C North is nearest...don't mix it up with C-South—not on the map) which is even closer to Brookens but reserved for faculty and staff. Easiest access if walking is an issue, is to be dropped off in the circle that feeds the Public Affairs Building that houses Sangamon Auditorium. When you walk in, take the first corridor to your left and keep going. It's a passageway to the Library. Ask for the Brookens Library Auditorium. Someone is always on hand to give directions.
