





MAKING NEWS: The momentum of previous months continued with a press conference on June 17 to debut the Society's new on-line county history encyclopedia, SangamonLink.org edited by Mike Kienzler (at left), a long-time Society member and retired night city editor of the State Journal-Register. Print and electronic media turned out in force at the Old State Capitol for a demonstration of the new on-line resource that will eventually contain thousands of entries about every facet of Sangamon history. Society executive coordinator (below) was also on-camera to provide details. Members of the Society attending the annual dinner later that evening also saw the site in operation for the first time. Segments of entries are also appearing in the SUNDAY A.M. Section of the SJ-R twice a month, with the Society's logo prominently displayed. 


