Expert to Detail Area's Italian Heritage, January 16

Bill Cellini Jr. to Discuss Research


Italian genealogy expert Bill Cellini Jr. will provide texture to the fabric of history woven by Sangamon County's Italian population when he speaks to members and guests of the Sangamon County Historical Society on Tuesday, January 16.

The meeting, free and open to the public, begins at 5:30 p.m. in Carnegie Room North at Springfield's Lincoln Public Library, 326 South Seventh Street.

A descendant of a Sangamon County Italian immigrant family, Cellini, based in Chicago, frequently conducts public seminars on Italian genealogy. Awarded a bachelor of arts degree in history from Illinois College and a bachelor in fine arts degree from Columbia College Chicago. he has also provided post-graduate studies in American History at the University of Illinois Chicago.

Cellini is a member of the Roman Cultural Society and the Italian American Studies Association, the latter a nationwide organization that explores, authenticates and interprets the wide range of experiences of Italians in America including culture, history, literature, demography, folklore and politics.

year. 2018 is significant for the state of Illinois because it is the year.

the Illinois Bicentennial – 200th anniversary. Illinois has a long interesting history that you will hear more about during the year.

Other significant dates of that year are:

In early 1818, Illinois was only a territory, but plans for statehood were already in the works. On April 18, 1818, the Illinois Enabling Act was approved by the U.S. Congress, which allowed the Illinois territory to begin the process of forming a constitution and

*August 26, 1818, an Illinois Constitution was adopted at a convention in Kaskaskia, where the State Capitol was located.

•October 6, 1818, Shadrack Bond was inaugurated as the first Illinois Governor.

Illinois' application for statehood as the 21st state. Our state's population was 34,620 at the time. Most of the residents lived in the southern portion of the state along rivers and forested areas. The prairies are largely unsettled and Chicago was an unimportant village.

•January 1, 1948 – The last Sangamon County resident •December 3, 1818, President James Monroe signed to have served in the Civil War died at age 98. > •January 31, 1952 – Chatham's last passenger train left village station at 2:48 p.m.



SangamonLink.org editor Mike Kienzler details the New Year's party-pooping

impact in 1918 after city residents voted to ban saloons and alcohol. It's one of several new articles just added to the Society's on-line encyclopedia of Sangamon County history.

Also new to the site is a look at the danger mosquitos posed to early residents of Central Illinois and the first dial telephones put into service in Sangamon County in the Illinois Statehouse...

Contributor Chuck Stone provided photos and a map of Camp Butler as a Civil War training center, tracking its transformation into a prisoner of war compound.

"The end of the Civil War in 1865 also brought an end to the sprawling camp. By 1866, most of the training

camp had been demolished, and within a few years, nothing was left as a reminder of the important activities that transpired there," Kienzler writes.

"Today's Camp Butler National Cemetery is just northwest of the training camp grounds. It is the final resting place for many Union and Confederate soldiers."

In the early 1950s, Buck moved to Boston, where he was an administrative secretary for the Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital. While there he was season ticket holder for the Boston Symphony Orchestra and the New York Metropolitan Opera. He also traveled extensively both before and after his retirement in 2003, and subsequent return to Springfield, noted Furry.

"Though in his early 80s, Dan was not the retiring sort. He came to work for the Illinois State Historical Society as a volunteer in 2004, walking from his home on East Adams Street to the ISHS offices around the corner, up two flights of stairs, always carrying a bag
