

Women's History

March is Women's History Month. We salute a couple of Springfield's unsung women leaders who are not commonly recognized.

March 1, 1894: Annie Rheem Hannon announced her candidacy for re-election as Sangamon County school superintendent. Hannon had become the first woman to hold county office in 1892, when she was appointed superintendent following the death of the previous superintendent, her father. She went on to win election on her own in November 1892, even though the electorate was still entirely male. In 1894, however, Hannon's fellow Democrats rejected her bid for re-nomination. It would be another 58 years before another woman was elected to a countywide office in Sangamon County.

March 17, 1914 - Women turn out in massive numbers to register to vote for the first time in a Springfield city election (previously, women could vote only in school elections). Before the one-day registration event, 663 women were eligible to cast ballots; by the time registration sites closed on March 17, an estimated 11,000 women were on city voting rolls. The oldest, Catherine Bergen Jones, 97, would cast the first ballot of her life a month later.




