Kathryn Harris Wins Lifetime Achievement Award from ISHS

Kathryn Harris, a former president of the Sangamon County Historical Society, has been awarded a "Lifetime Achievement" award from the Illinois State Historical Society. She was one of four Illinois citizen/ historians cited for "significant contributions to their communities and to the state. The other recipients, R. Eden Martin, William Daniel Wilson, and Mark Sorensen were from Wilmette, Albers, and Decatur, respectively.

The award was presented at a recent ISHS luncheon at the Old State Capitol in Springfield.

Harris, who served as SCHS president from 2004-2005, recently retired as director of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library, a position she assumed in 2004 with the opening of the facility. She previously was director of the Illinois State Historical Library, a position to which she was appointed in 1996, A graduate of Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, and the University of Illinois Graduate School of Library and Information Science, Urbana, joined the ISHL staff in 1990 as Supervisor of Reference and Technical Services. She has been a member of several key boards and associations. Her talents extend to the stage. She is frequently called upon to re-




