

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

Capitol Foundation.

With a limit on 130 players, prizes, great food and drink, it's no surprise that last year was a sell out. You'll be hearing more about the popular event in next month's *Historico* and on-line at the Society's website, sangamonhistory.org, along with ticket and table ordering information.

Doors will open at 6 p.m., with game time at 7 p.m. in Foundation Hall on the lower level of the Old State Capitol building. Entrance will be through the lower level, or via elevators and stairs from the plaza above. The site's underground parking facility will remain open afterhours to accommodate the event. Usual under-
