My Home. My History. Stories of Personal Collections

Personal stories of Sangamon County's rich history will feature presentations by several society members about a favorite historical object from their personal collections at the Society's February 16 meeting.

"My Home. My History" will provide an opportunity for people to

share their personal history which is not always seen in museums and books. Through this program the stories often shared between friends and family are able to have a wider audience, and attendees will have the chance to learn about history from a personal viewpoint," said Genevieve Kaplan, program committee member.

The February program meeting will be held Tueday, February 16 at 5:30

p.m. at the Carenige Room North, City of Springfield's Lincoln Library, 326 South Seventh St., Springfield.

Some of the items presented will include china pieces in the autumn leaves pattern, which was one of the largest premium items in U.S. history. Mary Alice

talk about these items that were distributed in the 1930s by Jewel Tea Company.

Heather Wilkens, also a member of the program committee, will

moderate the program and will showcase a book, "Looking for Lincoln in Illinois: Lincoln Springfield," created by the Lincoln Heritage Coalition and written by Bryon Andreasen. This carefully researched book includes fifty stories about Abraham Lincoln and is richly illustrated.

Genevieve Kaplan will discuss her grandfather's decades long career in the Secret Service. While living in Springfield, Robert Weed took a job with the Secret Service in Chicago. Then in the 1950s, he transfered to

Washington, DC, where he served under several Presidents from Dwight Eisenhower through Ronald Reagan.

Roger Whitaker will share information about his collection of tele-

graph keys. The collection focuses on the JH Bunnell company, founded after the Civil War, by Jesse Bunnell,

The New Year started with a terrific program from the "impressive" General Grant portrayed by Larry Werline. Many thanks to Vicky Whitaker, Sangamon County Historical Society board member who has been Program Chairman for the past three and one half years and has done a marvelous job of coordinating a variety of presentations and trips.

Sangamon County residents can be proud of the legacy our ancestors left us. As a society, we take pride in showcasing this rich history.

Over the past several months, society members have toured several area museums: Illinois State Military Museum, SIU Pearson Medical Museum, Air Combat Museum at the Abraham Lincoln Capital Airport, Chatham Railroad Museum, and we were the last visitors to the National Museum of Surveying before it's unfortunate closing.

Our programs also have traveled to the Illinois State Supreme Court Building, Edwards Place, Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and back stage at the Springfield Muni.

Members have enjoyed talks by several authors: Taylor Pensoneau who discussed his biographies of important Illinois politicians, particularly Governor Walker, Ken Mitchell, who discussed his book, "North End Pride," and Tennessee attorney Jerry Potter, who spoke about his book, "The Sultana Tragedy" and its Springfield connection.

We also heard from World War II and Korean War veterans, enjoyed music from the Lincoln Era and learned about 1800's fashion, spooky Sangamon County, Illinois State Fair history, how the weather has changed the area, Lincoln Era society and courtship, Thomas Jefferson and the Shape of Illinois, from telegraph to telephone as well as the preparation efforts of re-enactors. Mike Lelys, Oak Ridge Cemetery Director gave a talk about the cemetery just before the SCHS October Cemetery Walk.

Hopefully this review of SCHS's many programs will encourage members to make a special effort to set aside the third Tuesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. and attend our programs. Most of the SCHS programs are at the City of Springfield Lincoln Library in the Carnegie Room North and are open to the public.

When the SCHS programs travel to other sites, space may be limited, so these programs are for members only.

Remember, there is a special seat for you at the next meeting on Feb. 16, so please come and bring a friend!

If your organization is seeking funds to a local history project, the Sangamon County Historical Society is taking applications for funding new historic projects within the county that carry out its mission, to preserve and promote interest in the history of Sangamon County.

Groups and individuals are invited to apply for grants of up to \$1,000 for projects that are of interest and value to citizens of the county.

Over the past three years, the Society has given Special Projects grants to the Oak Ridge Cemetery to repair the bell controller; assist with the purchase of necessary equipment to establish a tree ring analysis laboratory, and for a National Public Radio series on WUIS-FM about Sangamon history.

one of President Lincoln's telegraphers. The examples of Bunnell telegraph apparatus date back to the late 1800s and early 1900s including one modern re-issue of a miniature working telegraph key made as a novelty for a 1905 dinner honoring Andrew Carnegie. The dinner was attended by such notables as Edison and Firestone, all of whom had a telegrapher background.

Whitaker's other pieces in the collection are representative of equipment used here in Springfield during the heyday of the telegraph.

The above mentioned are only a few of the personal histories that will be shared at the meeting. There will be more interesting historical surprises in store for those who attend.
