

After his overall 16-year stint with the Post-Dispatch ended in 1978, Pensoneau began a 26-year career with the Illinois Coal Association, the trade organization for the state's coal industry. He retired in December 2003 as president of the association.

Pensoneau and his wife Elizabeth, the retired editor of **Outdoor Illinois** magazine, own and operate Downstate Publications. In addition to his role with the Sangamon County Historical Society, he is the former president of the board of the West Sangamon Public Library District.
