Book Talk and Sangamon Valley Room Tour To Offer New Vistas on Springfield's History


Society members and guests will get a two-for-one program, Tuesday, April 18, a "Talk and Tour" that will combine an inside look at the challenges of producing of a new book about Springfield's history with a tour of the newly refurbished City of Springfield Lincoln Library's Sangamon Valley Room

The "talk" portion, starting at 5:30 p.m. in Carnegie Room North, will feature authors Curtis Mann and Linda Garvert discussing their latest book, *Images of Modern America: Springfield*, just published by Arcadia. The talk and tour make for a perfect fit.

Mann oversees the City of Spring-field Lincoln Library's Sangamon Valley Collection and serves as Spring-field city historian. Garvert, a librarian who holds a masters degree in instructional media, worked alongside Mann and his predecessor, Ed Russo at the Sangamon Valley Collection for 29 years. She retired in 2014.

The tour that will follow is just a few days short of the 48th anniversary of the original opening of the Sangamon Valley Room, an event that then underscored the role the Society

To celebrate our history, you may want to take a look at some of the more significant historical happenings in Sangamon County in the month of April as compiled by Mike Kienzler. - ♦ April 14, 1846 The Donner Party leaves Springfield. http://sangamoncountyhistory.org/wp/?p=63
- ◆ April 29, 1871 Sharon Tyndale, Illinois Secretary of State from 1865 to 1869, was shot to death the morning of April 29, 1871, in what became Springfield's most enduring murder mystery of the 19th century. Tyndale

- ♦ April 4, 1911 Two women were elected to the Springfield School Board, the first women to serve on a local governing body. Mrs. S.J. Hanes and Mrs. Hugh T. Morrison (newspapers at the time identified married women by their husbands' names), the only two women on the 18-person ballot, "were both elected by substantial majorities," the Illinois State Register reported on April 5, 1911. http://sangamoncountyhistory.org/wp/?p=2666
- ◆ April 1915 The *first weather report* ever transmitted by radio was a test sent from an experimental station based in Illiopolis sometime in April 1915. Filing Deadline April 12 for Annual-**Special Project Awards Competition**

Need financial underpinning for a new history project? The Sangamon County Historical Society may be able to help, provided your application for a Special Projects Fund grant is received by the Wednesday, April 12 deadline.

Groups and individuals can receive grants of up to \$1,000. The projects must have long-term impact and be in keeping with the Society's mission to preserve and promote interest in the history of Sangamon County. Work must start after July 1, 2017 and be completed by June 30, 2018. The Society awards up to \$3,000 a year in the annual competition for funding

Applications are available on-line at www.sangamonhistory.org. Completed forms can be submitted online or mailed to the Sangamon County Historical Society, Special Projects Committee, P.O. Box 9744, Springfield, IL 62791-9744. Award winners will be announced at the Society's annual dinner in June. For more information, call 217-525-1961.

Special Projects grants have been used to repair the Oak Ridge Cemetery bell controller and repair a weathered, interpretive Bell Tower marker that explained that a marble slab inlaid on the Tower was the one upon which the remains of Abraham Lincoln were first placed in the cemetery's receiving tomb. A Special Projects grant also helped purchase equipment to establish a tree ring analysis laboratory at the Illinois State Museum, and for a National Public Radio series on WUIS-FM about Sangamon history. Previous grants also have underwritten permanent historic flora and fauna markers for a nature path at the Clayville Historic Site; and historic signage in the Village of Williamsville.




